EXHIBITION OVERVIEW

The decoration of skin with ink is one of the oldest forms of documented art—tracing back to the Neolithic period. Modern tattooing continues this rich lineage, pushing the boundaries of artistic expression and challenging societal perceptions of body modification.

Featuring the work of ten Western New York tattoo artists, *Inkfluence* celebrates the artistry and culture of American tattooing.

Tattoo artists create works in a wide variety of styles that each have their own artistic conventions, including Dark Art, Neo Traditional, and more. Every design holds meaning, whether they are humorous works, powerful memorials, or intimate cultural symbols.

Tattoo images highlight how tattoo artists create art that is uniquely designed to flow, complement, and incorporate human anatomy. Beyond ink, other artwork including paintings, mixed media, and more reveal the wide breadth of art created by these artists and the relationship between different artistic mediums.

Olivia Bruning immersed herself in drawing each day while growing up in Ransomville and Wilson, New York. Her father, Ken Tower, instilled in her a strong foundation in art emphasizing light source, shading, and the interplay of light and dark.

Even as a child, Olivia always saw herself as a tattoo artist with multiple birthday cakes made by her father featuring tattoo machines. As a single working mom at the time, the unpaid apprenticeships to enter the tattoo industry presented a unique challenge.


However, an opportunity finally presented itself during the COVID-19 pandemic and remote work. After completing an apprenticeship at Pebbles Ink and Piercing in Niagara Falls, New York, Bruning reconnected with Kyle Tomlin and joined Ink & Oil as one of their artists.

Olivia Bruning enjoys the precision in tattooing whether creating a realistic portrait, fine line floral patterns, sketches of animals, or dotwork designs. Bruning's work often incorporates a blend of styles, showcasing her versatility and artistic exploration.

Inspired by nature and her own artistic upbringing, Bruning is passionate about continuing to learn and improve her skills as an artist. Her tattoo moniker—Heathen Ink—is a memorial to her grandfather who used to jokingly call her and her siblings "heathens."

Beyond tattooing, she continues to be an avid illustrator, regularly commissioned to draw portraits of family members and loved ones.

A journey into customizing and drawing designs on shoes, began four years ago, spurred on by a request from her brother.

Peregrine Tattoos | North Tonawanda, New York

Eva Huber's whole life has revolved around art—whether drawing, painting, photography, fabrication, or tattooing.

Initially deterred by a negative experience getting her first tattoo, she was drawn back to the art form after witnessing the creative and welcoming atmosphere at Renaissance Tattoos in Buffalo, New York and the work of Cory Cudney.

Huber apprenticed at Tracy's Tattoos in North Tonawanda and later with the legendary Kate Hellenbrand (1943-2022) at Shanghai Kate's in Buffalo, where she immersed herself in the deep history and culture of American tattooing.

Her two decade career as a tattoo artist has taken her across the country and overseas. Huber has worked in studios throughout America and Europe, while also exploring diverse tattoo traditions as far afield as New Zealand and its Māori *Tā moko* tattooing.

Known for her illustrative style, Eva Huber's designs emphasize movement and fluidity, blending traditional American tattooing techniques with contemporary illustrative elements.

With a focus on custom work, Huber is dedicated to creating unique and personalized designs for her clients, prioritizing their vision while providing expert guidance.

Drawing inspiration from nature and botanical themes, her work focuses on intricate yet distinct ornate designs.

Beyond her illustrative aesthetic, Huber focuses on proficiency in every style, tracing back to a mindset from her apprenticeship: to meet any challenge that comes through the door.

In addition to her artistic practice, Huber finds meaning in reconstructive and cosmetic tattooing.

KEITH KUZARA

Sink or Swim | Niagara Falls, New York

After getting his first tattoo alongside a friend at Living Canvas Tattoo Studio in Buffalo, New York, Keith Kuzara fell in love with the art and culture of tattooing. He dove headfirst into learning all he could: drawing tattoo art, researching different styles, reading books, and consulting tattoo artists while getting inked.

Through dedication and perseverance, Kuzara grew his skills in the first few years to a level where he joined My Kiss Tattoo in Buffalo in 2010 and later Pirates Alley Tattoo in Lockport. In 2012 Kuzara joined Sink or Swim and purchased the shop—which he currently co-owns with his wife Shannon Kuzara—three years later.

Throughout his journey as a tattoo artist, his lifelong passion for music has walked hand-in-hand with his career, as tattoos are a prominent part of the metal and punk communities. Performing in bands like My City My Secret and Wasn't a Phase, and attending local shows led to new clients, connections, and opportunities to showcase his work.

The linework, contrast, and composition of Keith Kuzara's work is characterized by careful observation of real-life subjects, tattoo design research, and a desire to constantly challenge himself as an artist.

Kuzara feels a particular closeness and affinity for Neo Traditional, Illustrative, and Neo Japanese styles in tattooing, rooted in his earlier embracing of American Traditional.

Kuzara enjoys coming up with bold designs that feature animals, faces, and intricate floral elements as framing devices.

Beyond creating designs on skin, his interest in the merch side of tattoo culture and background in computer graphics has led him to another creative outlet: translating classic tattoo designs onto clothing through Apparition Apparel Co.

Shannon Kuzara has held a deep love for creating art—whether drawing, painting, or crafting—for as long as she can remember. Her pursuit of studio art classes in high school and college further fostered her interest in a wide range of artistic mediums.

Kuzara's entry into the world of tattooing came on her 18th birthday and getting her first tattoo—an anchor—at Twisted Tiki Tattoo in Tonawanda, New York. While drawing alongside her husband Keith Kuzara every night while they were dating, her interest in pursuing a career connected to her love for art, blossomed.

In 2013, she began an apprenticeship under Dan Whipkey, then owner of Sink or Swim, and still remembers one of her assignments—recreating an entire wall of old Sailor Jerry tattoo flash. Kuzara later became co-owners of Sink or Swim with Keith Kuzara, who had purchased the studio from Whipkey in 2015.

Shannon Kuzara's distinctive approach to Neo Traditional tattoos is characterized by a vibrant color palette and unique stylistic approach.

Kuzara's style emphasizes different line weights to create dimension and features bright, eye-catching colors that allow her designs to stand out dramatically. She traces this passion for creating bright tattoos that "can be visible from across a room" to a childhood love for the bright aesthetic of Lisa Frank.

In addition to tattooing, Kuzara has a wide range of artistic pursuits, including watercolor paintings of landscapes from around the world she has visited—reflecting her love of travel and experiencing other cultures.

A lifelong passion for crafting and creating something tangible continues to inspire Kuzara, whose small, detailed art pieces showcase her meticulous attention to detail.

JORDY LEVEA

Sink or Swim | Niagara Falls, New York

Jordy LeVea's journey to becoming a tattoo artist was driven by a lifelong fascination with tattoos, sparked by seeing someone with a full blackout sleeve at a family barbeque as a child.

Her early interest led her to pursue art in high school where becoming a tattoo artist revealed itself to be her desired career path—and she dove straight into the world of tattooing.

Despite facing challenges during her apprenticeship and early career, LeVea's determination and perseverance established herself in the industry.

After a brief stint in Connecticut, LeVea reconnected with Keith Kuzara at Sink or Swim and joined the studio in 2019.

Jordy LeVea's dark art style is characterized by bold, ornamental blackwork, intricate lettering, and Japanese-inspired elements.

LeVea's work often incorporates fluid, organic forms and high-contrast designs, drawing inspiration from the swirling patterns of black bath bombs in water.

Earlier in her career, LeVea also became known for large-scale gothic architectural designs, sometimes constructed out of detailed lettering.

In addition to being a tattoo artist, LeVea is also an avid painter and founded a clothing line, Crooked Spire.

Across her body of work, LeVea thrives in the realm of controlled chaos, creating designs and movements that are both free-flowing and intentional.

DAVID MACKENZIE

Rock Solid Tattoos | Lewiston, New York

Growing up in Canada, David Mackenzie entered the world of tattooing through the skate scene, a passion for skateboard graphics, and helping clean and maintain a tattoo studio.

At Way Cool Tattoos, Mackenzie apprenticed under "Harley" Charlie Duarte (1958-2015), and was later hired by "Crazy" Ace Daniels (1951-2010), owner of the Way Cool Tattoos chain of tattoo shops.

With Way Cool, Mackenzie worked alongside artists in a number of studios across Southern Ontario.

Mackenzie later immigrated to the United States and opened his own studio, Rock Solid Tattoos, in Niagara Falls, New York where it remained for over a decade before moving to Lewiston in 2019.

David Mackenzie's love for classic Americana tattooing is rooted in the history and cultural meanings of tattoo flash and their aesthetic of a strong graphic image that grabs the viewer.

With over 25 years in his career as a tattoo artist, Mackenzie strives to be a chameleon who works in a wide range of tattoo mediums and styles beyond his own area of passion.

He finds influence for his designs in everything from historical tattoos to contemporary pop culture.

Mackenzie draws inspiration from the ever-evolving tattoo scene and constant push to always learn new skills, techniques, and designs.

His work is driven by a passion for storytelling and human connection, with a deep fondness for the role tattoos can play in bringing people together.

Maer Rose was born into a family of quilters and musicians in Wheatfield, New York—and got her first tattoo at the age of 18 when returning from boot camp.

Raised in a conservative environment, Maer remembers the reaction to her proclaiming at the age of 7 that she wanted to be a tattoo artist when she grew up.

While owning a quilting business in Boston, Massachusetts and continuing to get tattoos, Maer began brief tattoo apprenticeships while living in Boston and later in Spokane, Washington.

After returning to Western New York, Maer apprenticed under Mike Recchione at Born N Raised Tattoo Gallery in Niagara Falls, New York and dove into pursuing her childhood dream of being a tattoo artist.

Maer Rose's work as a tattoo artist is characterized by a dynamic and eclectic approach that blends multiple influences, including geometric precision, the fluidity of watercolor, and old school designs with a twist.

Rose is particularly drawn to geometric styles that require intense focus, finding passion in the hyper-vigilance of creating precise lines.

The unpredictable flow and fading of colors in watercolor painting and tattoos also holds a special place in her heart. She enjoys experimenting with humor, form, and color.

Rooted in her background of quilting and self-taught artistic practices, Rose approaches tattooing as a continuous learning process, combining technical skill with creative freedom, and always seeking to push the boundaries of her artistic expression.

COLE TIEDEMANN

Black Bear Tattoos | West Seneca, New York

Growing up in the Tuscarora Nation community, Cole Tiedemann comes from a family of artists including beadworkers, painters, storytellers, and sculptors. His deep roots in Haudenosaunee culture include the stories he learned growing up at his grandmother's house, where the family would gather, celebrate, and share stories.

Cole's interest in tattooing came at an early age, seeing family members and people in the community get tattoos.

He started experimenting with tattoos around age 12, tattooing himself and his brothers in a self-taught manner.

After spending three years building his portfolio and approaching different studios, he secured an apprenticeship under Gavin Royce of Relentless Tattoo Company in Niagara Falls, New York around 2014, and later joined Black Bear Tattoo in West Seneca, New York as a studio artist.

Drawing inspiration from his family and cultural heritage, Cole Tiedemann developed a unique style that blends Black and Grey Realism with deep Haudenosaunee cultural influences, characterized by a reimagining of traditional motifs. Tiedemann draws inspiration from various sources to create meaningful tattoos that honor Indigenous culture, including books, beadwork, and each client's cultural narratives. In addition to this focus, he enjoys dark surrealism and biomechanical designs including the work of Swiss artist H.R. Giger (1940-2014).

Alongside his work as a tattoo artist, Tiedemann has long enjoyed and focused on airbrush painting. Whatever medium he is working in, he aims to challenge stereotypes and promote a more accurate representation of Indigenous culture. By sharing his art with the world, he hopes to inspire others to appreciate the rich history and traditions of Indigenous peoples.

KYLE TOMLIN

Ink & Oil | Niagara Falls, New York

Kyle Tomlin's lifelong passion for drawing and painting permeated his childhood, including a ceiling mural he painted when he was around 12 years old.

A graduate of Lewiston-Porter High School, Tomlin's education in art from Niagara County Community College (now SUNY Niagara) and Buffalo State University helped hone his painting and knowledge of three dimensional forms.

As a senior in college, Tomlin began his apprenticeship with Mike Recchione at Born N Raised Tattoo Gallery Inc. in Niagara Falls, New York.

Tomlin worked out of Born N Raised for around ten years, leaving to pursue an opportunity to open his own studio in Niagara Falls, New York—Ink & Oil—in 2021.

Whether it's a realistic portrait or an abstract design, Kyle Tomlin's artistic vision and influence from his arts background shines through his work as a tattoo artist.

Tomlin's background in sculpting informs how his designs flow on the body, making use of digital tools such as *Procreate* or *Nomad Sculpt* to envision each work. Coupled with his emphasis on light, shadow, and perspective, Tomlin seamlessly integrates fine art principles into his tattooing.

Known for Black and Grey Realism, Tomlin traces this focus back to one of the first oil paintings he had done: a black and white portrait of John Lennon.

Together with charcoal drawings, oil painting continues to be one of his go-to forms of artistic expression as he continues to explore its interrelationship to his tattooing.

MARK ZASTROW

Ink & Oil | Niagara Falls, New York

A native of Niagara Falls, New York, Mark Zastrow developed a passion for art through high school art classes, and got his first tattoo at the age of 18 from Mike Recchione at Born N Raised Tattoo Gallery in Niagara Falls.

After graduating from Niagara Wheatfield High School and working as a barber for seven years while pursuing murals, chalk art, and music on the side, Zastrow continued to get more and more tattoos as he found a home in the culture and atmosphere of tattoo shops.

He approached Kyle Tomlin—who had done a few tattoos on him while at Born N Raised—for an apprenticeship when Tomlin opened his own studio, Ink & Oil in Niagara Falls.

A lifelong fan of the visual art and storytelling power of comic books, Mark Zastrow finds inspiration from comic book artists and contemporary pop culture. In his original tattoo designs, Zastrow draws influence from the iconic harsh lines, vibrant colors, and motion lines of comic books—and the playfulness and color blending of new school tattoos.

His artistic journey has been marked by a passion for creativity, with influences ranging from comic book artists like Greg Capulo (Spawn, 1993-2000, 2003-4; Batman, 2011-16) and Ken Lashley (artist for Marvel Comics, DC Comics, and more), to early art classes in high school.

Zastrow finds joy in his work as a tattoo artist in the connection with clients and the "zen mode" he experiences while tattooing. Beyond tattooing, Zastrow is a multifaceted artist who enjoys painting, chalk art, and music—particularly hip-hop, where he continues his passion for drumming by creating beats using MIDI (Musical Instrument Digital Interface) controllers.
